



The Rapid Response Mechanism (RRM) is designed to monitor humanitarian action, conduct multisector assessments, emergency NFI distributions and WASH interventions when there is no capacity on site. Currently, RRM is made possible through the generous support of the CERF, Denmark, Ireland, Canada, European Commission's Humanitarian Aid and Civil Protection Department (ECHO), Global Thematic, OFDA, Japan, CHF and SIDA. 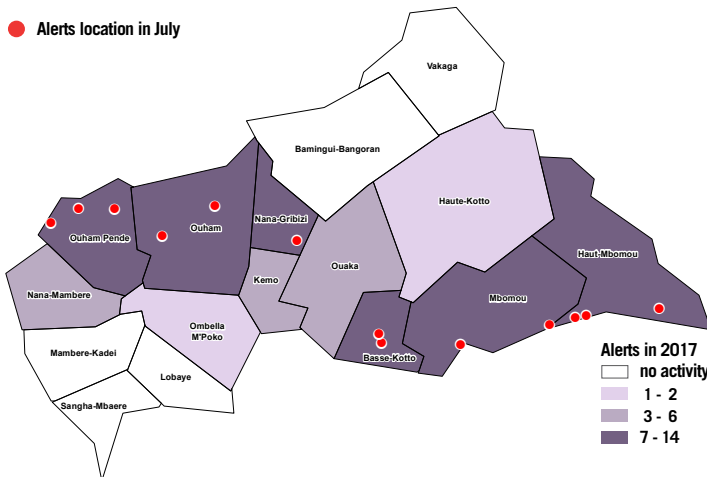

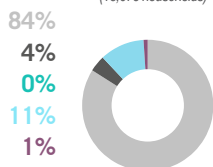
Alert distribution in July and in 2017



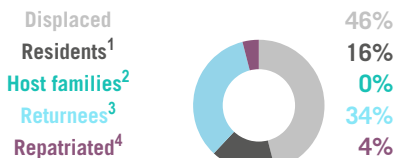

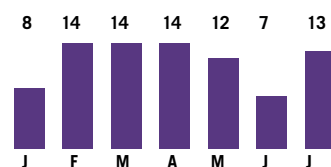

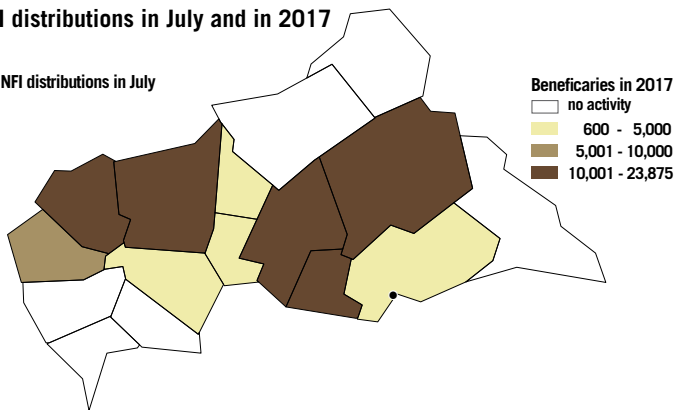
Alerts received or sent monthly in 2017

NFI distributions in July and in 2017

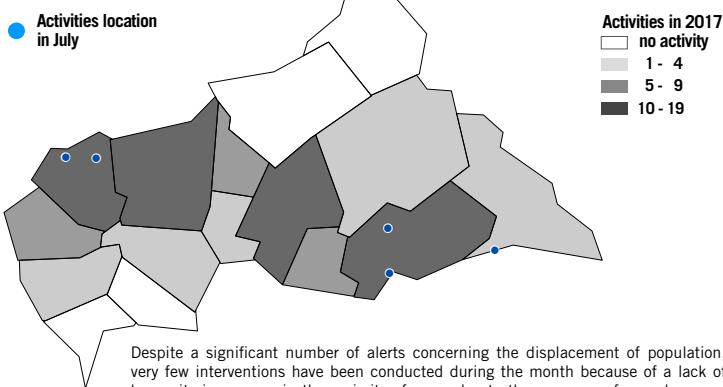

Activity distribution in July and in 2017

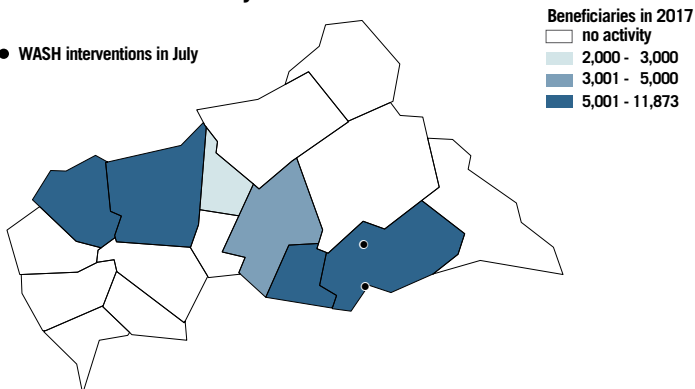
