2. Background & Rationale

The current Iraqi internal displacement crisis originated with conflict in Anbar governorate between Armed Groups and the Iraq Security Forces (ISF) in late 2013, rapidly spreading to Ninewa and other central governorates of Iraq in June 2014. The spread of insecurity led to large scale displacement with nearly 3.5 million internally displaced persons (IDPs) identified across Iraq and 322,346 individuals registered in the 59 formal camps in Iraq as of April 2016. In October 2016, an operation to recapture Mosul city and surrounding areas was launched. Since then, the entire Eastern bank of Mosul has been under ISF control since January 2017, whilst military operations are continuing in the rest of the city. According to government figures, the cumulative number of IDPs since the beginning of the Mosul operation is beyond 393,000 people who remain displaced in camps and host communities as of 17th April 2017.

Considering the rapidly-changing context of the crisis, up-to-date information about the needs and vulnerabilities in camps is necessary in order to prioritise needs appropriately and understand how the needs of those displaced evolve. In order to procure this information and therefore inform a more effective humanitarian response, REACH and the CCCM Cluster have been conducting Quarterly IDP Camp Profiling that aims to provide regular and updated information on developments, needs, and gaps in all accessible IDP camps across Iraq.

REACH Initiative conducted seven rounds of IDP camp profiles and mapping in the Kurdistan Region of Iraq (KRI), in May 2017, December 2016-January 2017, August-September 2016, June April 2016, January 2016, December 2015, June 2015, January 2015 and April 2014. . With camps developing swiftly since the last round of assessment (December 2016-January 2017), accessible camps in Ninewa were added to the eighth round of Camp Profiling. (Nargizilia 1 & 2, Chamakor, Haj Ali, Hamam Al Alil 1 & 2, Hasansham M2, Qayyarah Jeddah and Qayyarah Airstrip).). To monitor these camps comprehensively and inform a more effective humanitarian response, the CCCM Cluster updating the profiles and maps should occur on at least a quarterly basis.

The main audience for this information is the humanitarian community, and specifically those actors working in IDP camps in all sectors. The data collected by the Camp Profile will provide a comprehensive evidence base for programming and for future monitoring exercises inside camps. In addition, the data collected by the Camp Profiling will inform future planning by the CCCM cluster, as the primary harmonized mechanism for assessing IDP camps across Iraq.

3. Research Objectives and Audience

The central objective of the Camp Profiling assessment is to enable effective prioritisation of assistance in internally displaced persons (IDP) camp across Iraq through providing up-to-date cross-sectoral information on the needs and vulnerabilities of IDP households living in camps across Iraq. The central research objective is divided in the following four areas:

Specific objectives:

1. To provide household-level data on IDP needs and vulnerabilities in camps, with a cross-sectorial focus.
2. To provide up to date information on service provision and existing infrastructures in the camps.
3. To map camp layout, infrastructure, roads and facilities.
4. To enable a longitudinal analysis of the needs and vulnerabilities of IDPs in camps assessed during the previous seven rounds of camp profiling.

4. Research Questions

Camp infrastructure

- What is the current status of the camp? (Location, type, size, capacity, population, management agency)
- What infrastructure exists at the camp? (Ongoing extension, presence of roads, drainage, fencing, WASH facilities)

CCCM

- What is the (if any) camp management structure? (IDP committees, representativeness of committees)
- What communication mechanisms are in place, and are camp residents aware of them? (legal rights, registration, complaints mechanisms)

Household Profile/Protection

- What is the average household profile? (Demographics, civil documentation, chronic illness, disabilities, unaccompanied or separated minors, PLW)
- What are the intentions of households residing in the camp? (intentions to move, HH members from AoO intending to join family in camp)
- What are the priority needs for residents in the camp? (As reported by households)
- What restrictions are in place? (Ability to enter/exit the camp, to have cellphones)

WASH

- Do households have access to minimum standard WASH services? (Storage tanks, water sources, functional latrines and showers, frequency of solid waste disposal)

Education

- Do children have access to minimum standard education? (Attendance, reason for not attending school, access to CFS)

Health

- Do households have access to adequate & sufficient health services? (polio vaccination rate, supply of medicine of PHC needs, obstetric/antenatal care)

Food security

- Are households food secure? (receiving food assistance, PDS assistance, FCS, access to markets, coping strategies)

Shelter/NFI

- What are the top 3 priority needs for Shelter, NFI, winter and summer items at the household level?

Livelihoods

- Do households have access to livelihoods? (income sources if any, number of days worked if any, coping mechanisms)

Longitudinal analysis

- How have the needs changed inside IDP camps since 2014? How are the needs of IDPs evolving with time?

5. Methodology

5.1. Methodology overview

This project will follow a mixed methods approach through making use of household-level surveys, key informant interviews, GPS tracking, satellite imagery and secondary data sources. Data collection will be conducted in IDP camps in Anbar, Baghdad, Erbil, Dohuk, Missan, Najaf, Ninewa, Salah al-Din and Sulaymaniyah governorates. Data will be cleaned and analysed using SPSS and excel.

5.2. Population of interest

Geographical area: All accessible camps of Iraq with less than a hundred households. Some camps are not accessible due to security reasons.

Population: IDP households residing in camps (household surveys), camp managers (Key Informant interview)

5.3. Secondary data review

- Camp Profiling Rounds I, II, III, IV, V, VI and VII will be used for the longitudinal analysis conducted for the comparative report. Findings from earlier rounds in every sector (WASH, Shelter, non-food items (NFI), Food security, Education, Intentions) will be compared to all the findings of round VIII in order to draw out trends in the evolution of needs of displaced person in camps.

- Other assessments from partners published in a similar timeframe will be used in order to triangulate findings from this round in the comparative report.

5.4. Primary Data Collection

Method: Quantitative survey

Sampling: IDPs residing in camps in all accessible areas of Iraq: 95/10 at camp level based off the population of each camp.

- Point-based sampling will be applied in the field. This seeks to avoid sampling bias that could result from the collection of an unrepresentative composite sample due to a high portion of subsamples collected from the same area – this is a lesson learned from the previous round of camp profiles, due to little prior knowledge of within-field variability. A grid of points is generated across the camps, from which points are randomly selected using GIS. Sampling maps will be provided to the teams; in the field the nearest household to each point is then interviewed.
- For camps that have already been mapped, the grid points that fall inside infrastructure can be removed, thereby sampling only from residential areas. For new camps, boundaries and general layout will be collected beforehand in order to generate grid and to remove as many infrastructure-points as possible - if a sampled point falls on infrastructure the nearest household to that point is still interviewed.
- New satellite imagery will be ordered for each camp, and GPS tracks of key infrastructure/programme buildings will be taken by field teams. If mapping and/or the household-level assessment reveals key concerns that are deemed appropriate for thematic mapping, if necessary field coordinators will return to the camp to take thematic GPS tracks to facilitate GIS analysis.

Tool: Questionnaire based off earlier rounds of camp profiles, but incorporating lessons learnt (questionnaire available in Annex B). Some protection questions were excluded from questionnaires for camps in Kirkuk, due to the sensitive nature of those questions in Kirkuk governorate.

- As much as possible, data will be uploaded on a daily basis by REACH Senior Field Coordinators (SFCs) to be cleaned by the JAO who will provide feedback to the SFCs. Feedback will be shared on a daily basis via (google spreadsheet) or phone with REAH FCs to support their morning debriefing to the field teams.

5.5. Data Analysis Plan

- Data cleaning will be carried out by the JAO on a daily basis. Data that is deemed inconsistent will be highlighted and shared with the relevant Field Coordinator for clarification/rectification. These inquiries will be logged in a

shared Google Spreadsheet in which focal points for each base can provide responses. All changes will then be made and logged by REACH staff.

- Once data for all the camps has been completed, the JAO in charge will conduct analysis through SPSS and excel and amalgamate all the data into one database. There will be one dataset with all the household surveys and one dataset with all the KIs with camp managers.
- Data collected will also support comparative report writing.

Anbar which is causing further displacement towards Falluja and Ramadi districts, both in and out of camps.⁷ As the operations to retake Mosul city and other territories from ISIS progress, people have started to leave their area of displacement in order to return to their area of origin when safe enough.⁸ The waves of returns have led to a new phase in the national camp management strategy in the coming year as camps are closing and others consolidated. With more spaces available in camps, IDPs living in camps with poor conditions and infrastructures are being moved to relatively better camps as part of the consolidation strategy.

Considering the rapidly-changing context of the crisis with both waves of returns as well as some new displacement, up-to-date information about the needs of IDPs and available infrastructure and services in camps is necessary in order to address these needs as well as plan the camp strategy for the coming months. The conditions in camps differ greatly from one camp to the other as well as between governorates, thus regular monitoring of conditions is essential to strategize appropriately the consolidation of some camps and closure of others in the coming year. In order to procure this information, REACH in coordination with the CCCM Cluster have been conducting Quarterly IDP Camp Profiling that aims to provide regular and updated information on developments, needs, and gaps in all accessible IDP camps across Iraq.

Camp Profile:

REACH Initiative conducted eight rounds of IDP camp profiles:

With camps developing swiftly since the last round of assessment (May 2017), accessible camps in Ninewa, Baghdad and Salah al-Din governorates are added to the ninth round of Camp Profiling: Salamiyah (1 & 2), Salamiyah Nimrud, Al Amal, Muskar Saad, Hasansham U2, Al-Iraq Al-Muamad and Basateen Al-Sheukh. Several camps that have been closed or that have decrease to under a hundred households are not included in this round of Camp Profiling, this is the case for: Debaga Stadium, Qaymawa, Eyes of Missan. To monitor these camps comprehensively and inform a more effective humanitarian response, the CCCM Cluster updating the profiles and maps should occur on at least a quarterly basis.

Intentions Survey:

Further, the wave of returns from camps has to be closely monitored in order to understand the reasons why people can or cannot leave their area of displacement. Few surveys on intentions have been conducted so far, the main tool used by the CCCM only covered the Mosul emergency camps (13 camps). Up-to-date information is lacking regarding IDPs living in camps in the country (data for phase was collected in August/September 2017). The CCCM Cluster has asked REACH Initiative to conduct the intentions survey rolling it out to all camps in Iraq. Both the intentions and camp profiling surveys will be conducted at the same time.

The main audience for this information is the humanitarian community, and specifically those actors working in IDP camps in all sectors. The data collected by the Camp Profile will provide a comprehensive evidence base for programming and for future monitoring exercises inside camps. In addition, the data collected by the Camp Profiling will inform future planning by

the CCCM cluster, as the primary harmonized mechanism for assessing IDP camps across Iraq. Conducting these two assessments make REACH one of the main actors providing information on the intentions of IDPs in camps and their current needs.

3. Research Objectives

The central objective of the Camp Profiling assessment is to enable effective planning in line with the needs and intentions of internally displaced persons (IDPs) living in camps across Iraq.

Intentions Survey:

1. Identify for each camp the proportion of IDPs who intend to return, relocate and remain in place in the coming months.
2. Identify potential timing, scale and geographical destinations of movements in order to plan the closure and consolidation of camps.
3. Identify needs and vulnerabilities that may influence movement intentions or be exacerbated by choices of return, relocate or settle in place.

Camp Profile:

4. Provide household-level data on IDP needs and vulnerabilities in camps, with a cross-sectoral focus.
5. Provide up-to-date information on service provision and existing infrastructures in the camps.
6. To map out the layout, infrastructure, roads and facilities in each camp.

4. Research Questions

- What is the proportion of IDPs in camps that are intending to return to their areas of origin within the next three months?
- What are the reasons why households decide to return to the AoO?
- What type of information about the Area of Origin (AoO) has been received, and what information would be needed?
- Where are the households intending to return to in their AoO (their previous property, somewhere else) and are they able to return to their previous location?
- What was the household's livelihood source prior to displacement and what livelihood opportunities are available in their AoO now, if any?
- Protection concerns over the security and safety of vulnerable people (women and girls, elderly and disabled) if deciding to return?

Camp organisation

- What is the current status of the camp? (Location, type, size, capacity, population, management agency)
- What infrastructure exists at the camp? (Ongoing extension, presence of roads, drainage, fencing, Water and Sanitation (WASH) facilities, Child Friendly Spaces (CFS))

CCCM

- What is the camp management structure, if any? (IDP committees, representativeness of committees)
- What communication mechanisms are in place, and are camp residents aware of them? (legal rights, registration, complaints mechanisms)

Household Profile/Protection

- What is the household profile of camp residents? (Demographics, civil documentation, chronic illness, disabilities, unaccompanied or separated minors, pregnant and lactating women (PLW).)
- What are the priority needs for residents in the camp? (As reported by households)
- What restrictions are in place? (Ability to enter/exit the camp, to have cellphones)

WASH

- To what extent do households have access to minimum standard WASH services? (Storage tanks, water sources, functional latrines and showers, frequency of solid waste disposal)

Education

- To what extent do children have access to minimum standard education? (Attendance, reason for not attending school, access to CFS)

Health

- To what extent do households have access to adequate & sufficient health services? (polio vaccination rate, supply of medicine of PHC needs, obstetric/antenatal care)

Food security

- To what extent are households food secure? (receiving food assistance, PDS assistance, FCS, access to markets, coping strategies)

Shelter/NFI

- What are the top 3 priority needs for Shelter, NFI, winter and summer items at the household level?

Livelihoods

- To what extent do households have access to livelihoods? (income sources if any, number of days worked if any, coping mechanisms)

5. Methodology

5.1. Methodology overview

This project will follow a mixed methods approach through making use of household-level surveys, key informant interviews, GPS tracking, satellite imagery and secondary data sources. Data collection will be conducted in IDP camps in Anbar, Baghdad, Dohuk, Diyala, Erbil, Ninewa, Kirkuk, Salah al-Din and Sulaymaniyah governorates.

The quantitative household survey will be conducted amongst a random sample of each camp's population, ensuring findings are statistically representative with a 95% confidence level and 10% margin of error. The tools for the intentions survey and the camp profiling survey will be merged into one tool. Data will then be cleaned, weighted and analysed using both SPSS and excel.

5.2. Population of interest

Geographical area: All accessible camps of Iraq with over a hundred households. Some camps are sometimes not accessible due to security and safety restrictions.

Population: IDP households residing in camps (household surveys), camp managers (Key Informant interview)

5.3. Secondary data review

- Camp Profiling Rounds I, II, III, IV, V, VI, VII and VIII will be used for the longitudinal analysis conducted for the comparative report. Findings from earlier rounds in every sector (WASH, Shelter, non-food items (NFI), Food security, Education, Intentions) will be compared to all the findings of round VIII in order to draw out trends in the evolution of needs of displaced person in camps.
- Intentions Survey Phase I (13 Mosul emergency camps) dataset, analysis and report.
- Other assessments from partners published in a similar timeframe will be used in order to triangulate findings from this round in the comparative report.

5.4. Primary Data Collection

Method: Quantitative survey at the household level

Sampling: IDPs residing in camps in all accessible areas of Iraq: 95/10 at camp level based on the number of households living in each camp, the full list of camps assessed and the sample size for each is available in the Annex 2.

- Point-based sampling will be applied in the field. This seeks to avoid sampling bias that could result from the collection of an unrepresentative composite sample due to a high portion of subsamples collected from the same area – this is a lesson learned from the previous round of camp profiles, due to little prior knowledge of within-field variability. A grid of points is generated across the camps, from which points are randomly selected using GIS. Sampling maps will be provided to the teams; in the field the nearest household to each point is then interviewed.

- For camps that have already been mapped, the grid points that fall inside infrastructure can be removed, thereby sampling only from residential areas. For new camps, boundaries and general layout will be collected beforehand in order to generate grid and to remove as many infrastructure-points as possible - if a sampled point falls on infrastructure the nearest household to that point is still interviewed.
- New satellite imagery will be ordered for each camp, and GPS tracks of key infrastructure/programme buildings will be taken by field teams. If mapping and/or the household-level assessment reveals key concerns that are deemed appropriate for thematic mapping, if necessary field coordinators will return to the camp to take thematic GPS tracks to facilitate GIS analysis.

Tool: Two versions of the tool will be used: HH and KI surveys.

Intentions Survey: The tool was slightly updated based off feedback from NRC and DRC, most indicators remain comparable with the first phase of the Intentions Survey conducted in the 13 Mosul camps in August/September.

Camp Profile:

The tool will be amended based off feedback from the CCCM Cluster and partners, however it remains similar enough to the previous rounds in order to enable a longitudinal analysis.

5.5. Data Analysis Plan

- Data cleaning will be carried out by the JAO on a daily basis. Data that is deemed inconsistent will be highlighted and shared with the relevant Field Coordinator for clarification/rectification. These inquiries will be logged in a shared Google Spreadsheet in which focal points for each base can provide responses. All changes will then be made and logged by REACH staff. This applies to the all the data collected through household surveys as well as KI interviews.
- At the end of data collection there will be three datasets:
 1. Intentions HH survey: dataset with the demographic section + the intentions indicators will be created in order to be shared with the CCCM Cluster. The information collected regarding intentions at camp level can be sensitive, therefore this dataset will not be published but given to the cluster who will then share with partners accordingly.
 2. Camp Profile HH survey: dataset with all the surveys of the camp profiling, as well as the intentions indicators if the intentions survey has been conducted at the same time. This dataset will be used to run the analysis for the purpose of the camp profiling outputs (profiles, directory).
 3. Camp Profile KI dataset: dataset with all the KI forms from each camp manager. The KI dataset will be used to inform the camp directory, but no analysis will be run on it as the findings can be used as they are (for example: number of individuals in the camp, number of latrines in the camp, etc.)
- Once data for all the camps has been completed, the JAO in charge will conduct the analysis:
 - Analysis will be conducted at camp, governorate and national level.
 - In order to run governorate and national level analysis, the dataset will be weighted at each level to which the findings are aggregated to
 - SPSS will be used in order to run custom tables and excel will be used for any demographic questions which require to compare the number of people in a certain category to the total amount of people in the camp (demographics, vulnerable populations, children by gender and age for school attendance)
 - The results will be compared to the ones of the previous rounds of camp profiling in order to identify trends in the evolution of needs with time.
