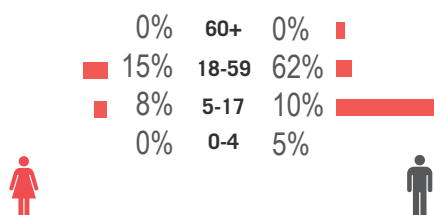

### Sex and age of individuals



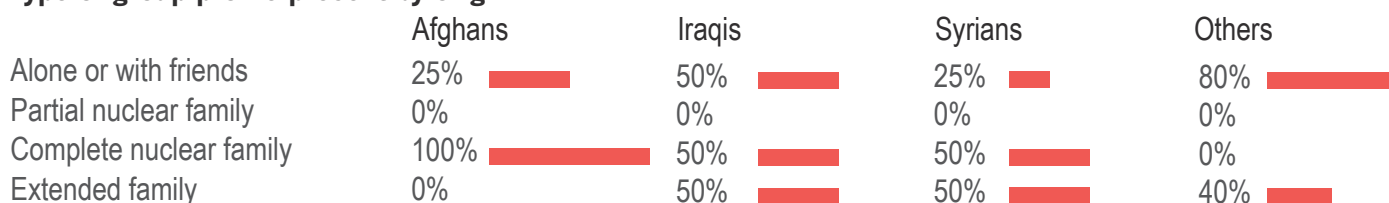

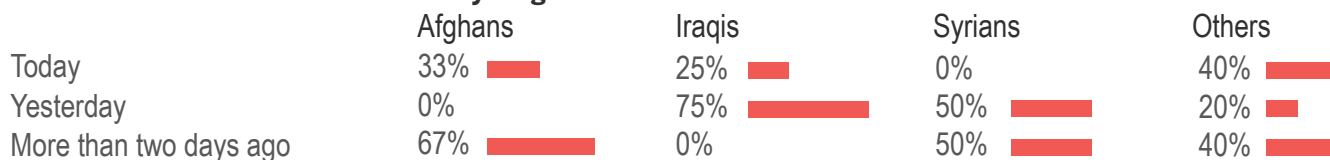

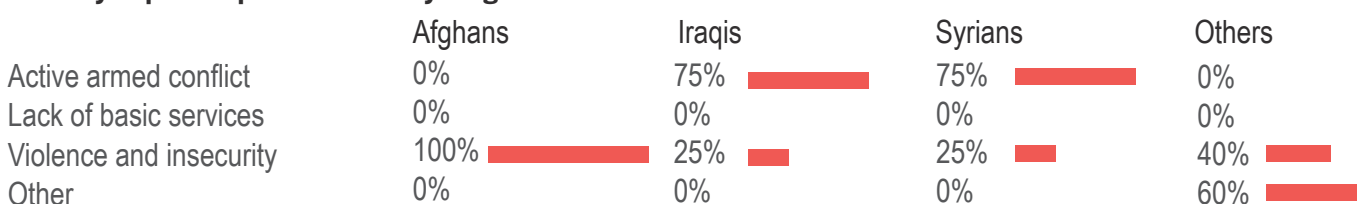

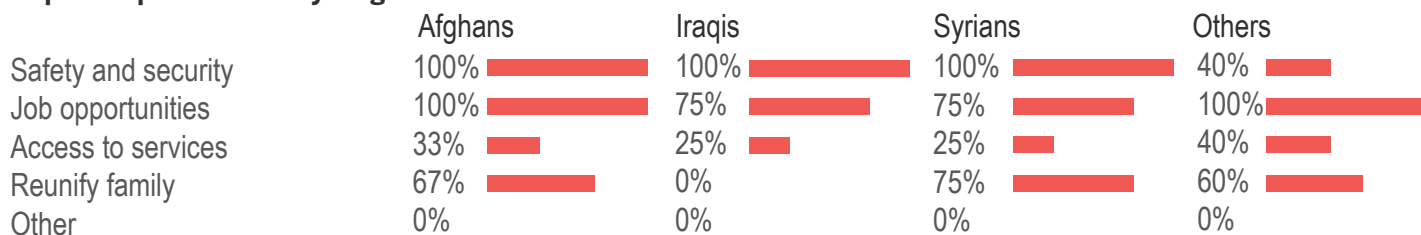

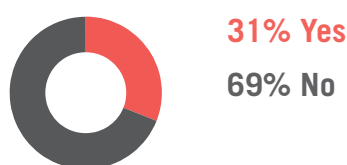
